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From The Vicarage



November – a Season to Remember.

A few years ago, a day trip to France found us eating our lunch in a converted WW2 German Bunker. 'Not the most salubrious of surroundings' we were told, 'but the food is excellent.' True, it was not the most 'salubrious

of surroundings', but what an incredible place it had been transformed into.

High up on a hill, overlooking Calais and the Channel, the white cliffs of Dover visible on a clear day, we sat with a panoramic view of northern France to the south and southern England to the north. Even with your mind firmly fixed on the 'repas du jour', you couldn't help but wonder what had gone on in this concrete fortress, built for its original purpose, some seventy five years ago.

The functional structure of the building and the commanding views conjured up scenes of plans being discussed, hopes being expressed, and fears being whispered. How many times had field glasses been trained on that expanse of water that separated goals achieved from goals sought; from the brutal appropriation of swathes of Europe to the fragile liberty still held by mainland England. All that potential, just eleven miles away, could have been realised if different decisions had been taken by the German powers of the day.

Sitting there, in the midst of living history, one couldn't help but feel a strange eeriness. It was a site that was once in the throes of carnage, of death, of abuse of power, of victimisation – of greed. As we drove up the narrow winding one lane road to the bunker, the pot holes from the bombardment of allied shells were plainly visible either side, reminders of a defiance against the threat of such evil – for that is what greed is.

And yet it was clear that the circle had turned, as generations had gone by. The sea of mud and shrapnel that had scarred this place was once again a scene of rural beauty, laid beneath a carpet of grass. The horrors of war had re-moulded the landscape as cows and sheep now grazed peacefully in the hollow dips, carved out by man's fight against man. This place - this piece of history - could never be just a restaurant. It was a living reminder of how capable humanity is of horror. And yet, the very dark purpose that it had been built for had been wonderfully transformed into a place of laughter, of fellowship, of food and wine, of fun and hope. All history shapes the future of creation: and yet it is we who have the responsibility of using history in the moulding of that future.

On this Remembrance Sunday, November 13th, we too are invited to visit places which remind us of how recent history has shaped our lives. Churches, Memorials, with their Rolls of Honour, The Last Post, 'We will remember them' and the National Anthem – all pointers to darker days - days that have fashioned our personal landscape. We remember those who were part of that period of history, from our towns, our villages, our communities and our families, who may once have trod the same part of France we were in just a few years ago, who would have faced that common enemy, greed, no matter what its uniform or disguise may be.

So it is good - no, it is important - that we should recognise each year this most significant, yet receding period of our history, and acknowledge how it has scarred our own landscape and how we have remoulded it. For it is not just about the lives that were 'sacrificed' in the name of liberty and democracy, but how it has built and shaped our lives now. And it is important too that we should recognise the turning of the circle for this generation – that the 'freedom' we enjoy now is not just because of that 'sacrifice' that was made then, but what we have done – and are still doing - with that 'freedom' that was fought for.

Our day trip to France, our meal in the restaurant that was once a German bunker, epitomised our need to recognise history in our present day, to look at what we have, because of what has happened and how we have transformed it.

So please join us at 10.30am St Michael's, Crambe, on Remembrance Sunday, so we can acknowledge with respect those involved in an horrific part of history.

But let us also recognise that what we have today isn't just dependent on yesterday: it is what we have done - and continue to do - because of yesterday.





News, views and information from:

BOSSALL

The church yard has had its annual cut and looks tidier. The work requested by the Quinquennial report has also been completed.

A group of bell ringers have been during the summer and given a report on the state of the bells which will be discussed at the next P.C.C.

The scaffolding is still in place in order that the Wyvern (on the roof top) can be inspected as it has been somewhat crooked for years and probably needs stabilising.

BUTTERCRAMBE

We have had a busy summer with two weddings at St John's with the receptions being held at Aldby Park. We have enjoyed two different types of services from the regular format which have been well received. The Gregorian themed Service held in September was the last of Chris's Spa Experiences. It was a magical evening and all those who attended came away feeling spiritually refreshed and replenished with requests for 'When is the next one?' Thank you to Chris and Hannah for taking the service. A 'Songs of Praise' Service on Sunday 11th Sept when the congregation chose their favourite hymn and explained why they had chosen it. It was well supported by the residents of Buttercrambe.

Harvest Festival: We had a full church on Sunday 2nd October for the Benefice Harvest Festival service. Thank you to Peter and Ellen who brought the Benefice Choir. The church was beautifully decorated, thank you to all those who contributed. We would like to thank Chris and Hannah for leading the service. Lunch was then enjoyed at Aldby Park. Thank you in particular to Ann Archer and Sara Winn-Darley who prepared and served the food. £160 was raised for St John's Church.

Open Gardens: Over 130 people attended on Monday 29th August when Joe and Clare Horsley and George and Sara Winn-Darley opened their gardens. After an unsettled few days of weather, we were blessed with sunshine and

tea and scones were enjoyed in the Rose Garden. Ann Archer was in charge of the Produce Stall which raised £106 and Clare Horsley had organised the Tombola which made £126. Thank you to everyone who contributed, helped and supported us. £1,000 was made for the Church.

Repairs to the Church: The Estate team have been doing some work to the Church. In line with advice to remove the hard cement pointing, all of it has been replaced with a lime mortar mix on all elevations. Work has been carried out to install stainless steel to pin and secure a crack in the bell turret and secure the bell fixings. The broken wooden bell wheels have been replaced as advised by the bell specialist Mr Potter and new wire ropes attached. The missing stone dog teeth in the ridge stones have been replaced. The main door has been sanded with stainless steel wool to reveal its natural silver oak finish as recommended by Peter Pace. Joinery repairs also to the main door.

Eight pew cushions have been kindly made by Sally Dykes. This has raised the seat to a much more comfortable height and has been well received. We are hoping to do the remainder next year.

Our Carol Service is being held at 6pm on Sunday 18th December. There will be mulled wine and refreshments served after the service. All are very welcome.

"Pipe Up!"

St Mary's, Gate Helmsley Centenary Organ Restoration Fund

The organ restoration work is still underway at PPO. Progress is good however as we saw at a further visit to the workshop in late September.

New bellows have been constructed and the organ frame has been partly erected in the workshop so that adjustments can be made to take account of corrections to the height of the pedalboard. The key and pedalboards are almost complete; the metal front pipes and wooden pipes have been repainted ready to be "voiced" – so that they make the correct sound.



The engraved lettering on the stopheads was done by hand in 1913 as shown in the picture. They are ivory and the surface of some have been carefully skimmed to allow re-engraving (by machine this time!) so that they can be re-used. A few new stopheads for the extra ranks of pipes and couplers will be required and we discussed how best

to match these with the existing ones. The new ones will be made from a synthetic material as close as possible to the colour of the originals.

So, we are getting steadily closer to the re-installation of the organ, probably not before the All Souls evening service on 30 October (sorry Peter and the choir!), but certainly before Christmas.

We wait to find out whether the old blower is up to the task or will need to be replaced. It is about the same age as the organist but hopefully in better condition!

The Fundraising Group is still happy to receive further donations to ensure that we have a small "contingency" reserve in case of unforeseen additional work that might be required.

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
