Greetings from St Botolph's Cottage, Bossall

My dear friends,

As I reflect on my recent holiday in Norfolk, I remember the vast ever changing skies, the rise and fall of the great North Sea, the golden sands that stretch unbroken along that coastline for sixty miles. Grey seals riding the surf, unafraid of anyone they might encounter, numerous seabirds and squalling gulls, little terns and diving cormorants, not forgetting fish in abundance especially the sea bass that can be seen at low tide.

What beauty and wonder has God created for us all to see and hear, to enjoy and to learn from. Having time and space to be still and quiet enabling us to reflect and appreciate all that our generous loving Father has given to us. I found in that holy place, with all that beauty, my weak feeble prayers had far reaching consequences, echoing the silent music of God's praise. It is at this point in the depths of our very being we can hear that still small voice of God speaking to us and to know His great love for each one of us.

We spent one day in Norwich, a city I did not know but came to love with its great cathedral standing at the centre of that very busy place, where many people down the ages have worshipped God and borne witness to the world of a God whose love is all embracing and unconditional towards all His children. Two such people I believe we can still learn from today.

Julian of Norwich lived as a hermit in the mid 1300's. In 1373 when she was only thirty years old Julian suffered a severe illness from which she nearly died. During this time she received a series of visions of the Passion of Christ and the love of God. When she recovered she wrote down what she had been taught. Her book 'The Revelations of Divine Love' took her over twenty years to complete and was the first book to be written by a woman. The most wellknown quote from the book is "All shall be well, all manner of things shall be well". In other words if we seek to know God first and foremost and seek His



kingdom everything we need in life will be given to us. That is our Lord's promise to each and every one of us.



The second person is *Edith Cavell* born in 1865 the eldest child of a local vicar. Alongside her siblings, she was taught by her father at home. She went on to train as a nurse at The Royal London Hospital in the East End of London from 1896-1898. Her great opportunity came when in 1907 she was invited by the leading Belgian surgeon Antoine Depage, to become a founding director of the first professional nurse's training school in Belgium.

Each summer Edith came back to Norfolk on holiday. In August 1914 she was with her widowed mother in her Norwich home when news came of the threat of German invasion of neutral Belgium. Edith immediately travelled back to Brussels to be with her nurses, and they cared for casualties regardless of national origins.

Although the German occupiers threatened death to anyone assisting allied soldiers, in early 1915 Edith became part of an underground network that enabled those caught behind enemy lines to escape from Belgium. Eventually Edith and the underground group were all arrested and imprisoned. She found her ten weeks in solitary confinement in St Gilles Prison in Brussels a great mercy, a time of healing, peace and calm after the constant anxiety and stress of her work.

Edith was eventually tried along with thirty four others and found guilty of treason. On 11th October 1915, she learned that she would be executed by firing squad the next morning. Edith faced her death with calm courage. As a Christian and as a nurse she had committed herself to the service of others, conscious that this might cost her everything even the sacrifice of her own life. Service to our fellow human beings is one of the greatest gifts we can give.

If you were in church for the Benefice Harvest Service you would have seen the response to the Family Shoe-Box Appeal and heard Chris and Sandra Leeming speak on the work of the 'Amen' project in Romania. It is such a little thing we can do for those less fortunate than ourselves, who in comparison have everything.

Standing together as the Benefice of Harton, whatever our church or village, if we could learn together to be still and quiet, listening to the voice of God

as he tries to lead us all into a greater relationship with Himself and each other, drawing from each other's strengths and weaknesses, sharing our resources and ideas and helping one another in love, thus we can like Julian of Norwich and Edith Cavell serve those around us and draw others into God's Family of the Church and so become God's Kingdom People here on earth.

Who are these men with sorrowful look, who can still remember the lives that were took? These are the men who saw young men die, the price of peace is always high.







The Palace staff were wonderful talking to us as we walked through the various rooms and halls to a small reception for all those receiving awards. At this point my daughter-inlaw Valerie and grandson Craig left us and Geoffrey and I were given an insight into how proceedings would follow.

After a short wait the formalities commenced at 11.00am when in small groups we were ushered through rooms highly decorated with paintings together with wonderful ceramics. Eventually we passed through the Great Hall where we saw Valerie and Craig watching the proceedings. I was then introduced to a member of the Palace staff who took over from Geoffrey and waited with me to be presented to Her Royal Highness The Princess Royal.

My name was announced and I went forward to receive my award and meet The Princess Royal, who was most gracious and chatted for a few moments. Her Royal Highness was keen to hear why I been nominated and about the time I had spent in Foston playing the organ, and engaging in other church and village activities. 
