

#### Dear Friends,

#### "The best laid plans...."

I remember reading a novel some time ago, which included the story of a man who wanted to go on holiday, without a guidebook, to Venice; he just wanted to wander around and discover what was there. The man's wife agreed and they had two weeks in which they appeared to amble around aimlessly, and yet saw all the great architectural and art treasures of the city. The man was pleased and told his wife, who usually planned their excursions to the last



detail, how his method was just as good as hers.

She smiled and nodded, not disclosing to her husband that, for two weeks beforehand, she had read every guidebook available and it was through her gentle but firm steering they had 'accidentally' discovered the treasures of Venice!

As someone who is an instinctive planner, I have a lot of sympathy with the woman in the story. I like to be prepared, to know where I am going (though not necessarily via the quickest route!), and generally happy with spontaneity providing I have planned for it! Equally though, I recognise that I live in a world of uncertainty and as, at the time of writing, there is still uncertainty of how Omicron or any new COVID-19 variant will impact our lives in the months or even years ahead. I know that uncertainty is something we all live with.

Even the most meticulous planners amongst us have to recognise that uncertainty is, and always has been, a part of life. When Abraham (then still called Abram) set out with his family from his home city of Ur, he had no idea where God was leading him. God's call and promise told him no more than he was to go "... To the land that I will show you. I will make you a great nation and I will bless you, and make your name great so that you will be a blessing... ". (Genesis 12:1-2).

When the Israelites left captivity in Egypt to journey to the Promised Land, when the prophets answered God's call to speak to other nations, when the fishermen left their nets at the call of Jesus and when Paul embarked on his missionary journeys, the mark of uncertainty about what the future would

bring was ever present. In these and many, many more instances, there was no clear plan or itinerary, no timeline and no agreed outcomes. What there was, implicitly or explicitly, was the promise that God, through Jesus and the Holy Spirit, would hold our hand (if we so desired) no matter where our journey took us. As Jesus said, at his Ascension, "and remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age". (Matthew 28:20). Things are no different now.

Faith does not depend on certainty and thankfully, does not depend on our advance planning. Whatever we think we know about our future, however we would like to see things turn out, we simply do not know what is around the corner. Circumstances alter, plans change and the unexpected becomes the reality. As people of faith, we are far better employed seeking not for certainty but instead to "... Run the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith...". (Hebrews 12:1).

I have no more idea than you what 2022 will bring us, despite my tendency towards planning and preparing. 2021 more than amply demonstrated the frailty of our plans, both as individuals and as a Church. So without doubt, the best way forward is to place our hopes and dreams in the framework of faith and "the assurance of things hoped for, the convictions of things not seen" (Hebrews 11:1).

Our next 'Messy' event to look out for is 'Messy Holy Week' which is on Saturday 9th April at Sand Hutton Village Hall.







# Benefice PCC.....

The Benefice PCC met in person on 17<sup>th</sup> November 2021. The following topics were discussed:

- Financial issues. There will be a rebate to parishes from last year's contribution to central benefice funds. Parish contributions for 2022 will be kept at the 2021 level. No central benefice contribution to York Diocese will be made this year. (Individual parishes will, as usual, make their own free will offerings)
- The benefice printer has come to the end of its life and will be replaced with a new one, this time leased rather than purchased
- A total of 180 shoeboxes were dedicated at a service in St Mary's Gate Helmsley in October before delivery to people in need in Romania through the Amen charity
- There is a new service schedule which includes Messy Church, All Age Worship and a monthly Zoom service. New orders of service are being developed for Morning and Evening Services
- All parishes responded to the Diocesan survey, "Living Christ's Story".
   Chris encouraged unity and co-operation across the benefice as this is taken forward

- Rachael Harrison's role as lead for children and family has been through its first 3-year cycle. This means that a new round of fundraising (from parishes and from individuals) is needed.
- A budget will be brought to the next meeting

The next meeting will be held at the Bakers', Holderness House, Claxton at 2.00 pm on Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> February.

The Honorary Secretary, Wendy Holman, would welcome items for the agenda.




### Carols on the Green, Claxton December 20th 2021

# News, views and information from around the parishes...... Rachel Benson



The following article is here by request for all to share. It is one I used with permission, as the basis of my sermon at the Christmas Day service held at Gate Helmsley. Dr John Habgood was Archbishop of York from 1983 until 1995. The article was found by his daughter Laura among papers he left after his death at the age of 91

#### Article for the Yorkshire Post – Christmas 1993

I remember the days when there used to be three London newspapers — The Star, The News and The Standard. They provided an excellent basis for a Christmas sermon.

The Christmas Star is a sign of hope. In the story of the Wise Men journeying to Bethlehem it is the star which alerts them and guides them and points them to the infant Christ.

The Christmas News is the good news of our salvation. It is the tidings of great joy which sent the shepherds running to the manger. It is the message which was eventually to be carried by the disciples to the ends of the earth.

The Christmas Standard is what follows from the news; a vision of what life could, and should be, if it were filled with the spirit of Jesus Christ. It is the call to holiness from God who, by meeting us in Christ, has set new standards of love.

I am sure the actual newspapers did not think of themselves in these terms. It was just their names which, by coincidence, told a story. But now two are gone, and only the Evening Standard remains. And there is a story in that too. British public opinion has recently and rightly shown much concern about standards of morality. There has been a somewhat frantic breast-beating about all that seems to have gone wrong in our society. There have been questions about whether we are offering our children and young people any decent standards at all. And there have been the inevitable demands that the churches should do something about it.

The trouble is that without the Star and the News, the Standard is dangerously isolated. Attempts to teach high moral standards have little on


which to base themselves without vision, and hope, and the good news. That good news that God cares about the kind of people we are. This is where people often get things the wrong way round. They think the standards come first and, provided our children are taught the Ten Commandments, then all will be well. The hope and new supposedly come later as a kind of rescue operation when we fail, as we inevitably do.

But Christian morality actually starts at the other end, not with what we do, but what God has done. He has come to us in Christ. He calls us to be his children. He fills us with his own love. He gives us a new vision and inspires us with new hope. And then he tells us to live like his children and be worthy of our vocation.

Christian morality, in other words, is not about striving with might and main to win favour with God. It is a response to his goodness, shown in Christ. Those who grasp this don't have to be exhorted to be good. They actually want to be. Some of this attitude can rub off on even the most unlikely people at Christmas time in response to the spirit of generosity, as they themselves experience a strange desire to share it.

This is not to say that morality cannot be taught without a religious basis. Clearly it can be, and there are many good people to prove it. Good people can encourage and inspire goodness in others, as a kind of human reflection of what Christians believe God does for us. But to expect the churches to teach morality without its religious basis would be nonsense. It is precisely because we have hope to offer and news to tell that we can commend a way of life inspired by thankfulness for what God has given us.

Christmas reminds us that the gift is for all, just as the call to live good, loving and generous lives is for all. The exchange of gifts with each other can attain a new depth of meaning as we think of God's stupendous gift of himself to each one of us.

## from Sister Margaret Ann CSPH

We were all saddened by the death of Desmond Tutu that great servant of the Lord. Known worldwide for his work, political, spiritual and physical to bring about peace and unity in that amazing diverse and beautiful continent of Africa, and indeed across the world.





The day I met Desmond Tutu is a day I will never forget. His face beamed like the sun.

Father Trevor Huddlestone was a member of the Anglican Religious Community of the Resurrection based at Mirfield, West Yorkshire. My community of St Peter at Horbury had a very long association with Mirfield. They provided great men as

Wardens, Confessors and Spiritual directors to the Sisters over the years and we held them all in the highest regard. People like Donald Paley, Keith Davey, Norman Blamires, Ronald Haynes, Gabriel Sanford Eric Simmons, Crispin Harrison and many more. All good and holy men.

The Community of the Resurrection did parish work up and down the country, had a large theological college based at the Mother House in Mirfield and two or three houses in South Africa. Trevor Huddlestone served in Africa during Apartheid and met Desmond Tutu in their early days and set up a lifelong friendship. All Bishop Tutu's children were named after Mirfield Fathers.

Each year Mirfield held what they called a Commemoration day. A large open day for anyone who cared to join them. It began with a service in the morning, picnic lunch on the sports field, and a speaker and entertainment in the afternoon. Hundreds of people turned up from across the country and it was always a very happy event I remember.

In the late 1970's it was my privilege to represent Horbury with several of the other Sisters, and Desmond Tutu was their guest. He celebrated the Eucharist and preached in the open air, which was unforgettable. He spoke about Transformation in the hands of God. Something that is offered to us all here in the Benefice of Harton if we place ourselves in our Saviour's hands.

In the afternoon Desmond Tutu mingled among the crowds clearly enjoying the day. He was like a ray of sunshine, bubbling with joy and love for all who he met, and overflowing with fun. What a man full of the Spirit of Jesus.





I was so reminded of this at the weekend when, on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of Epiphany we were thinking of the first miracle performed by Jesus at Cana in Galilee, the changing of water into wine. What a transformation that was! We too can be changed, transformed, if we simply place our lives in the hands of the Christ Emmanuel, God with us.

Part of a hymn I love to sing in the quietness of my room is:

'Sprit of the Living God
Fall afresh on me
Spirit of the living God
Fall afresh on me
Break me, melt me, mould me, fill me,
Sprit of the living God
Fall afresh on me.'

And a prayer quoted by King George VI in his Christmas broadcast on December 25<sup>th</sup> 1939, is my prayer for you all today, and for the year ahead, 2022.

'I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year: Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown. And he replied: 'Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God. That shall be better than a light and safer than a known way'

With my continual prayers for you all as we continue to grow into the Kingdom of God in this place.

#### **BOSSALL**

First the annual service of Remembrance on November 14<sup>th</sup>, which as ever was a poignant and sobering event, rightly remembering those who, in significant numbers from our Benefice, gave their lives for this Country during the two World Wars. Ian Lyall gave a moving sermon recounting his personal memories of family members affected by the conflicts. After the service, wreaths were laid at the Sand Hutton War Memorial.

The second of our services was a very happy and memorable occasion, with the baptism of Elodie (pronounced Eh-Luh-Dee) Rose Cohen. Elodie is the daughter of Rebecca and Daniel Cohen from Harton, and they manged to fill the church with some sixty family, friends and godparents. We received a most appreciative thank you note following the service which we would like to share, as it very succinctly sums up the event:

"Dear All,

We can't believe a week has already passed since Elodie's baptism. We would like to say a huge thank you to you all for your efforts to make her day so special. It meant the world to us to be able to share it with so many of our loved ones. In particular my father-in-law, who made it over from Cyprus.

Everybody felt so welcome and you also made our friends with small children feel at ease with the lovely things you said to them. We also appreciate how you made sure to include Edward the whole way through, which was very thoughtful.

That Sunday was finished off with a further service of evensong at 5.00pm. Sadly not terribly well attended, but as ever appreciated by the few who did turn out.

Our Christmas services at Bossall were curtailed slightly by the dreaded Covid, seeing the cancellation of the Crib service, but thankfully the Midnight Mass did go ahead.



The church looked magnificent with plenty of Christmas decorations, including a fabulous large Christmas tree very kindly donated again by Trish and Colin Russell from Claxton.

We kept to the tradition of a candlelit service, and had the benefit of at least some of our amazing choir, if not all, making it a lovely spiritual start to the official Christmas Day morning. We counted about 45 who attended, so not a record crowd, but certainly quality. One family announced they had travelled from attend, France to SO that impressive. They were staying with family at Westow.



On a final note, St Botolph's will be somewhat out of action for a couple of months now, as we start remedial works to the organ and flooring beneath the pews, all suffering with Death Watch Beetle and Woodworm

infestation. Additional work to the exterior is also being scheduled, including stonework, drainage and new rainwater guttering, all of which awaits further detailed design and necessary faculties. The total expected repair costs are extensive, and grant assistance is being sought. Should any members of the Parish wish to make a donation towards these costs, all contributions would be gratefully received!

### **BUTTERCRAMBE**

The last service we had at St John's Church was our Harvest Festival at the end of October which as always was well attended by the Buttercrambe residents and our loyal supporters from the Benefice. We had about 50 in the church and most of them came back to Aldby Park for lunch afterwards. It was a wonderful occasion and lovely to get everyone together again. Donations were split between Ryedale Food Bank and the church. Sadly we had to cancel our carol service because of a number of cases of COVID in the village. Our next Sunday service is not until May.

#### **CRAMBE**

There have been five services held at St Michael's over the past quarter, including the Festival of Lilies and Light on November 2<sup>nd</sup>, All Souls day. At this service we remembered those whom we have loved and lost over the years and more recently. The church looked beautiful, decorated as it was with a multitude of lilies and candles. The congregation was supported by the Benefice Choir with Peter Stott, and Caroline Hall sang a very moving rendering of Schubert's Litany. The collection from this service was split between the church and Winston's Wish, a bereavement charity supporting children and their families through a time of loss.





Due to the havoc created by Covid, many of the scheduled Carol services were cancelled. After a lot of creative thinking we decided to go ahead with our Celebration of Christmas in carols, poetry and prose by shifting it from inside the church to outside the church! With the help of Sam Cook a large tent was erected to provide some cover, two fire pits were placed outside, fairy lights were hung, candles lit and swags of greenery enlivened the tent. The flames from the fires and the twinkling lights created a very special atmosphere. The door to the church stood open and the view from the tent down the length of the darkened, but candle lit nave to the altar at the far end was stunning.

The service was a shortened version led by Rachel Benson. Well wrapped up against the cold some forty five people came, from infants to the elderly and all sang lustily well supported by the 'Women in Harmony Choir' with Caroline Hall directing and the singing was accompanied by Peter and Ellen Stott.

Bella O'Shaughnessy aged 8 from Barton sang the first verse of 'Once in Royal David's City' and Clare Steele-King from Crambe sang two solo verses of 'I saw three ships'. The children, Bella, Alex and George read a poem between them. It was all rounded off with mulled wine, sausage rolls and mince pies. A successful and memorable evening.

Maybe we will have some exciting photos!



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
