#### From Rev Nigel.....

#### Out of the darkness into hope.

#### Benefice PCC.....

The Benefice PCC's first meeting of 2025 was held at Crambe House on 16<sup>th</sup> January. Discussions included:

- A Lent course has been arranged by Reverend Nigel Benson. The theme is "Hope", which reflects the Diocesan theme for the Lent season. There will be 4 sessions on successive Wednesdays, 12<sup>th</sup>, 19<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> March and 2<sup>nd</sup> April, starting after the service and held in the same church. Details elsewhere in the Circular, with a list of 3 Lent lunches on 5<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> March and 8<sup>th</sup> April
- David Fletcher is retiring from his post as Honorary Treasurer. He was warmly thanked for his several years of service in this role, and for the excellent way he has kept the benefice accounts

- The Aubergine group is on hold for the present. There is a continuing need for more support from other parishes for Rachael Harrison and the team, and more involvement with the allotment. The group and the allotment are part of the whole benefice, which happen to be based at Upper Helmsley
- Safeguarding: we are still looking for a new Benefice Lead for Safeguarding. Until someone is recruited, Rachael Harrison is working to bring the local records up to date
- A service schedule has been produced for the whole of 2025. Copies will be printed for each church, to be placed in the vestry
- The website "A Church Near You" has been updated for each church in our Benefice. The contact person is now Reverend Nigel Benson (to replace Reverend Chris Wingfield). He will put a link to the benefice website in the entry for each of our churches. Churchwardens and parishioners are urged to contact Nigel to have news and information about their church included. At present there is no information at all under 9 of our 10 churches. This website is often the first port of call for outsiders searching for information about churches

The PCC will next meet on Thursday 17<sup>th</sup> April at 10.00 am at Delphinia Lodge, Upper Helmsley.



#### Romanian Shoebox Report December 2024

Thank you to every one of you for your support and prayers and for contributing again to the Amen Annual



This year David Fletcher volunteered to join the Amen team from the UK in distributing the shoeboxes and saw first-hand the families receiving your gifts. Our 170 shoeboxes went ahead of us by lorry and, with other contributors from across the UK there were almost 3000 shoeboxes in total.

There is a serious social problem with the gypsy population. Romania has more gypsies than any other European country, and they are totally despised by their Romanian neighbours, largely due to lifestyle issues.

The Roma gypsy communities live in rural villages in their own zones which in the main look like shanty towns. Many gypsy women and children suffer great hardship and live in extreme poverty and squalor. Often, children do not go to school. Early motherhood is the norm from 12 years of age upward. Hospital treatment is very difficult and always entails 'gifts' for every service. There is supposed to be free health treatment but in reality it is non-existent.

#### Here's my diary of the trip:

**Tuesday 10 December** We flew out from Luton Airport to Targu Mure, Romania. Our destination was Sighisoara, a holiday resort with beautiful buildings.

**Wednesday 11 December.** We covered a lot of ground today distributing shoeboxes to nearby villages in the morning.

Later, arriving in Danes at an inspirational centre, 'Perspective' run by Romanian Christians Liviu and his wife Elena along with their children, who aim to be role models for young people. You can see the work of 'Perspective' on their website https://perspectivedanes.ro/programs/after-school-program/

We played games; gave a puppet show based on Jesus calming the storm and his promise to be with us. We then did craft work making Christmas decorations. Romanians love singing and we sang together.

Their appreciation was obvious. We also went to village where a retired Nazarene pastor and his wife (Norman and Linda) from Belfast lived. They stored shoeboxes in their barn for us to load up.



**Thursday 12 December.** More shoeboxes distributed in the morning, well organised by a Roma lady who received a box as a child and now helps as an adult. John and Rosanne (Brits living in Romania at Perspectives Centre) kindly took us, and more shoeboxes to a residential home for the blind, deaf and handicapped. They were delightful and some read us Psalms from Braille and others sang solos of joyful songs.

**Friday 13 December.** We had an amazing breakfast at Perspectives Centre Danes and Chris Chatfield gave a talk on the love of God. We then went to another very poor gypsy village with the local pastor and Dave McGuire.

**Saturday 14 December.** We went to another village beyond Danes to give out shoeboxes. The local church leaders were very well organised and it was less demanding physical work. The village reminded me of Laramie the old TV western. The pastor's family operated a small shop with pasta and fruit and veg but no alcohol. They had a church built by Dave in the village.

Lovely morning worship in church down the road from our hotel. They had headsets that translated from Romanian to English for us. Two young women led lively worship with aid of a microphone and keyboard.

In the afternoon we went to gypsy village and joined a lovely service led by a gypsy pastor from a very poor background before his conversion to Christ. His two lovely teenage daughters who had bucked the trend of young motherhood and were going to school, had wonderful voices and led our worship. The prayer was on our knees accompanied by sighing and tears.

**Monday 16 December.** A long 2hr+ drive after breakfast to our last village Pe Lunca, where there is another centre for Roma gypsies funded by Amen, mostly run by a Flemish couple.

**Tuesday 17 December.** After breakfast we said our farewells to the hotel owner and left for a good journey to the airport and the flight back to Luton.

A very happy, healthy and peaceful New Year to you all. How quickly the time goes. Here we are already nearly at the end of January 2025. We have to make every day count before it is lost.

Mary was a lady I knew in Manchester many moons ago. She lived alone as all her family had long gone. She had been in the same house for most of her life. She lived in a street of back to back houses long gone too now.

Everything happened in the street. One could hear the sound of children playing, watch the old men leaning up against their doorposts smoking their pipes, and watch the world go by in the street. **BARTON LE WILLOWS** 

I am Graham, and I run the Free Cinema at Barton Le Willows Village Hall.

We have a 150 inch screen (that's nine times the area of a 50 inch TV) and a projector that shows films in ultra high definition. We also have a surround sound system for high quality audio. We have active 3D which is particularly good and it's great to see the children reaching out to touch things (apparently) in front of them. It's really worth seeing - a number of new arrivals are surprised when they first see the size of the screen and the quality of the picture.

It's a very friendly set up with a small group of (largely) local people that come on a regular or semi-regular basis. You can bring all your own food and drink (including alcohol). We take a break around half way and you can get ice creams, popcorn and make yourself a hot drink in the kitchen for a small charge (£1). People discuss the film or life in general. We have new infra-red heating and it was a comfortable 19 degrees centigrade in the recent subzero weather. Many people come for the company as much as the film.

Our licence does not allow us to charge for films or to advertise actual titles outside of the village hall. However, you can join the email and/or WhatsApp groups to be sent the upcoming titles. You can also suggest and discuss possible new films to see using these methods. If you can drum up a small group of half a dozen people that would like to come and see a particular film at a particular time, I can probably put it on for you.

We work by donations which support the cinema, and the running and improvement of the Village Hall. The most common donation is a fiver for a film and an ice cream. However, you really can pay less, or even nothing if the cost would prevent you from coming. If you are reluctant to pay nothing, even a pound makes us a pound better off. We're much cheaper than the commercial cinema and you can see a film that you missed when it first came out and won't be able to see again on the big screen.

I hope everyone is managing to cope in the recent bad weather. Cinema runs on alternate Saturdays and I was beginning to think that we were jinxed with two snow days and Storm Darragh affecting three recent Saturdays. The latter brought down a 350-year-old oak tree in my garden and I am still clearing up! It has also led to some smaller audiences.

If anyone wishes to come to the cinema but is not happy to drive after dark or in poor weather, just let Graham know in advance and transport can be arranged with one of our regular supporters.

One of the problems of being in a rural setting is our potential audience is relatively small. Given people's busy lives and heavy commitments some audiences can be quite small. Fortunately, with zero staffing costs and other low costs, we can afford to run these. However, we are keen to expand our audience to include all the villages in the Benefice and beyond, it's much more of a cinema experience when more people are sharing the film. We always welcome new visitors and you will quickly get to know the regulars.

#### **BOSSALL**



As many of the parishioners will have seen, St Botolph's currently covered in scaffolding and hoarding at lower levels. The repair works, being undertaken by GP Masonry Ltd, are progressing, although sadly slower than we would have hoped. We have been caught by persistent poor weather, and particularly the cold spell in the post-Christmas

holiday, which has delayed the re-start. Also, having been able to undertake closer inspection once the high level scaffold was erected, it became clear that additional urgent works were required, over and above the original specification drawn up by our architects, Purcell. This included loose coping stones at both transepts and at the chancel end, and widespread defective lead flashing, all of which has undoubtedly been adding to water ingress and inevitable damp to the main stone walls.

Revised budgets and specifications have now been prepared and agreed, but the estimated completion date for the contract is likely to move out to late March early April. All involved consider we must do everything possible to protect the safety, structure and fabric of this wonderful Church.

We hope to have the building open again for services just as soon as possible.

#### **CRAMBE**

Happy New Year if a little belatedly to everyone in the Harton Benefice.

It has been a busy time for St Michael's Church. At the end of October we hosted the Lily Festival, a special service of remembrance at which we remembered our personal loved ones. As ever the church was beautifully decked out with lilies and candles and the Benefice Choir under Peter Stott's baton, sang a very moving anthem. The roll of names was read, and everyone lit memorial candles.

On November 11<sup>th</sup> we said our farewells to Mike Le Masurier at his funeral. As it was Remembrance Day, with a packed out church, we remembered not only our own Old Soldier, but also the dead of past conflicts. It was very

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
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


