



Thankfully, with the easing of lockdown, some services have been held in church since Easter and more are planned over the coming months. Rachel Benson led a service of Holy Communion at St Mary's on 11th April, the first service in our church since Christmas morning.

The return of Spring, with the bulbs bursting into flower and the new born lambs in the fields, has been especially welcome this year – even if Winter has been trying to stage a comeback with some very cold and frosty nights and early mornings. The daffodils in the village verges have made a stunning display.

Sunday worship has been delivered largely through Zoom although more church based services are now being held due to the relaxation of restrictions. Here at St Michael's we have had two services. On Good Friday a number of us spent an hour in quiet reflection with Rachel Benson, and on Sunday April 18th we welcomed almost thirty people from the village and around the Benefice to a service of Holy Communion which was taken by Chris.

On the administrative side we have had our APCM at which Dorothy after many years' service as churchwarden retired. Two new churchwardens and a new PCC were elected. The church is grateful for the time and effort that Dorothy has put in over the years and to mark the occasion of her retirement Chris presented her with a bouquet of flowers at our last service. 
PUT LOVE IN WHERE LOVE IS NOT
