All good things come to an end, they say. And this is a good ending to a wonderful part of my journey, having been here amongst you for the past nine years. But as I begin a new part of my travels, on this road called 'retirement', it's time to stop and sit for a while to reflect.

There is a wonderful story about Jesus, a few days after he'd been crucified, where two friends were walking away from Jerusalem, on the road to Emmaus. Just chatting away about the annual Passover celebration and, of course, the crucifixion they'd witnessed, they were joined by a fellow traveller, who asked them about what had happened. And so, they spent the next part of the journey, walking and chatting with their companion until supper time. And then, as they were about to start their meal together, their companion broke the bread...... And they suddenly realised they'd been travelling with the crucified, but now risen Jesus all along. And they are amazed.....

But what happens to them next, I cry?!

I read that story time and time again and compare it to my own personal experience of Jesus. I see myself as one of the travellers, thirty three years ago, this time journeying by train from Tonbridge to London, chatting with my fellow companions. Stopping at a church to pray on my way to work, at the back of the Bank of England, I exit to see a stranger in a dog collar walk past. Silently, I jest with God: "Heavens, don't tell me you want me to become a 'priest'!"

And a physical jolt to the back of my neck, with the words "YES". My very own Emmaus, a Godly revelation and I am amazed....
Only this time I know what happens next!

It's been a thirty year pilgrimage of telling the Emmaus Road story, and many, many others about Jesus, everywhere I've gone. From a host of Suffolk villages and towns, through Worcestershire and South Birmingham, to here in Yorkshire, I've tried to walk alongside people on their own journeys, no matter how long or short that might have been.

And I don't think I'll ever really stop; for me, it doesn't matter whether I'm telling God's story as a Vicar, Rector, Area Dean, or 'retiree'...., I just see it as the pilgrimage of life we're all walking and sharing together — telling our stories and God's stories and how the two overlap or intertwine.

And I believe that's how it should be – actually, how we all should be.

Archbishop Stephen recently said he'd like to add three words to the end of the Bible:

"To be continued....."

And that's how I hope we all see our own pilgrimage of life with God, through Jesus.

So as I travel this new road of adventure called 'retirement', my prayer is that you, my fellow travellers, will always be on the lookout for other pilgrims who are curious about this 'Emmaus Road', who are drawn to walk with you, and want to hear you share your stories about yourself and Jesus. Because that's what we should be: Lookouts; Beacons; Storytellers.

So finally, thank you all — each and every one of you - for making us feel so welcome here in the Harton Benefice. You have been so kind to Thelma and I (and Alfie of course!) and have enriched our lives with your stories and for allowing us to be fellow pilgrims in your own walks of life and faith.

We say farewell, but not goodbye, because like all our journeys, they are: "To be continued "...

I became involved with St Mary's Haxby in about 2001, serving as a Warden for five years, and I was licensed as a Reader (LLM) in 2013, having studied at the University of York St John.

In 2019 I was ordained Deacon after training part-time at St Hilda's college, Mirfield. I was ordained priest the following year, serving my curacy in Haxby and Wigginton.

I am absolutely delighted to now be ministering in the Harton Benefice, and to be here for you all after Revd Chris retires. I look forward very much to getting to know you all and hearing about what is going on in your lives.

Benefice PCC....



The Benefice PCC last met on 28th March.

This was the last meeting with Reverend Chris Wingfield as chairman. Thanks were expressed to Chris for his work over the past 9 years and for the way he had led the development of worship and mission across the benefice.

Reverend Nigel Benson, newly appointed Assistant Curate to the benefice, was welcomed to his first meeting of the Benefice PCC. Nigel's Licensing Service was to be held that same evening at St Mary's Sand Hutton. This service turned out to be a great success in the presence of the Venerable Sam Rushton, Archdeacon of York, the Bishop of Selby, Bishop John Thomson, and several other clergy.

Topics discussed at the business meeting were:

- The financial accounts had been inspected and were approved
- John Holman had approved the decision to split the money (£1,350) raised at Wendy Holman's funeral between the 10 churches of the benefice, so that they could purchase something for their church in Wendy's memory. The honorary treasurer would action this
- Rachael Harrison, lead for children and young people, was concentrating her work on the youth group, Aubergine Operations. There would be a competitive "spudathon" and craft competitions over the Easter weekend. The back of St Peter's Upper Helmsley has been reordered to make space for youth activities, etc
- Various clergy recruitments are progressing across the Deanery
- Safeguarding: Emma Allen-Goss, lead for safeguarding, was progressing online applications for enhanced DBS checking where this was needed, and updating the policy documents
- Future services: Chris Wingfield would be holding a final service in each of the 10 churches during April, including a service of Choral Evensong at St Mary Gate Helmsley on Sunday 23rd April. The very last service would be Holy Communion at St Botolph Bossall 10.00 am Sunday 30th April. This would be followed by a buffet reception at Aldby Park Buttercrambe. Zoom services would continue to be held once a month. Ian Lyall had agreed to take on the hosting

The next meeting is scheduled for 6th June at 2.00 pm at Holderness House Claxton.



"He lives, He lives. Jesus Christ lives today
He walks with me, He talks with me

What an incredible story the Easter story is with an amazing happy ending. But NO! Its not the end of the story, but a new beginning of a new life in Christ.

After Jesus' Passion and death upon the cross on Good Friday, his close friends lovingly took him down from the cross and laid him in the tomb in the garden, saying their final 'goodbyes'. After three days Jesus returned to them, standing among them as they gathered in the Upper Room, for fear of the Jews. 'PEACE BE WITH YOU', a greeting he says to us all today 'Peace be with you' and he breathed on those frightened men and women his new resurrected life that we too may live.

No, it's not the end of the story it's only the beginning for each and every one of us. As I read through the Holy Week and Easter narrative, something struck me that I'd not thought about before. In all the agony that Jesus went through there were people standing by him trying to remain faithful, attempting to understand what was happening, wanting to support him, and love him. On Palm Sunday there was a man who gave Jesus the use of his own donkey to ride triumphant into the city of Jerusalem against all the odds. Remember how the crowds waved palm branches and shouted out 'Hosanna to the Son of David, blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!'

Then, a few days later in Bethany, the home of Lazarus, Mary and Martha, Mary poured expensive ointment over Jesus' head and feet as an act of love to the one who gave to them that new life in him.

On Maundy Thursday Jesus and his disciples gathered in the Upper Room, again a space loaned to the Master for the occasion. There Jesus washed the disciples' feet and they shared in the Last Supper.

That evening Jesus went out and into someone's garden, Gethsemane, and there suffered tremendous agony on our behalf. His sweat fell like drops of blood.

Then there was the cross on which Jesus died, mounting it as if a throne fit for a king, 'The King of the Jews.' At the end of that dreadful, dark and bitter day Jesus was laid by those who loved him in a borrowed unused tomb in the garden.

NO, it is still not the end of the story, but only the beginning. An opportunity for us all to give what we can to Jesus to be used for the spread of the message of Good News that Christ is risen and is alive today, walking with all of us in our everyday lives. Jesus lives on in the life that he gives to each of us. His life in us, and life in him.

'Were the whole realm of nature mine That were an offering far too small, Love so amazing, so divine, Demands my soul, my life, my all'

The way of return to God is through obedience to his will. What we have to realise is that God is ever present, IS WAITING FOR US TO LOOK AT HIM. He has given us the God-Man, the incarnate Word, not only as his image whom we may contemplate, but as the ONE WHO LIVES IN US, AND IN WHOM WE LIVE. He has given us also the individual power of the Holy Spirit helping us all to:

PUT LOVE WHERE LOVE IS NOT So, what can you give to the Lord of Life for the spread of the gospel of peace?

'Cambodia, Healing hearts and instilling hope '

My name is Lynne Barnett

I live in the Benefice of Harton.
I have worked with and supported the survivors of the Khmer rouge regime in Cambodia.
Let me share a little of my story, and how I wish to continue that support.



Generally speaking, people associate Cambodia with the phrase 'the killing-fields' or 'the Khmer rouge'; that is if they remember the Cambodian Genocide at all. It may help if I offer a short historical recap. I will start from the reign of the Khmer rouge. Many people often turn away at this point, but I respectfully ask you to continue reading...

On 17 April 1975, the Khmer rouge (KR) entered the capital city of Phnom Penh and evacuated the entire population into the countryside with a promise of their return after three days. The KR considered people in the city as being tainted by capitalism and of being elitist. The psychological manipulation they used, meant that at the time of the evacuation very little blood was shed. Nobody could ever have predicted what was to follow.

I will be careful with my words as the topic can be emotionally distressing.

I will just state that the nature of what followed the evacuation is beyond understanding. The KR wished to return the Kingdom of Cambodia to 'year zero'; with all educated, bilingual, skilled workers and people with 'status or high position', being the first to be systematically 're-educated', never to return. Over approximately 1.7 million people were dehumanised and died of malnutrition, illness, starvation, over-work and executions. Many KR soldiers were indoctrinated children; some of whom are the adults of today.

I believe it necessary to say, that the Cambodian people are mostly of humble nature, hard-working, resilient and appear to have a 'thirst for connectedness'. Cambodian people value education and have a wish to be self-sufficient and not dependent on international aid.

My work history in the 'Kingdom of Wonder'

In February 2005, I visited Cambodia for a one-off visit to explore the possibilities of short-term mission. Little did I know that it would lead to 18 years of volunteer work, and much respect for the Cambodians I have met and worked alongside. I travelled back and forth over the years, until eventually living there for five years; returning to the UK in July 2019 (but still supporting from a distance).

My volunteer work took on many forms, including working in a non-government organisation (NGO), which rescued sexually trafficked children. It was there that I became aware that a small number of staff wore the badge entitled 'counsellor', but at best, had only attended short workshops/training days. This is not a criticism of the NGO, but based on the fact that within the nation, there were no professional counselling training courses available. At this time, I was completing my Masters' thesis study based on intergenerational trauma. I suggested to anyone who would listen, that a professional training course was of crucial importance in a post-Holocaust nation; considering the intergenerational trauma and high incidence of family violence, distrust, dysfunctional relationships and psychosomatic illness - to name but a few issues that still persist following the regime. One amazing Cambodian woman responded to my suggestion with wit and enthusiasm, "You want it and see the need, you start it!". I just laughed.

The more I witnessed, the more driven I felt. When my volunteer contract ended, I decided to take a year to undertake a national 'assessment of need survey', which provided the evidence required for a training programme to begin as a pilot project. I developed a two-year part-time training programme, based on a western standard counselling diploma course. It was contextualised, with the help of the few professional Cambodian colleagues I knew, the majority of whom had trained overseas. (There are very few trained Cambodians in the field of mental health). The programme was then translated into the Khmer language ready for use. I travelled nationally to promote a clear understanding of what counselling is, by providing short interactive workshops. I had to design leaflets to promote the course and fundraise to support the programme.

The training course began in Phnom Penh in 2017. With few professionally trained tutors, we could only accept 15 students, of which we recruited 13. In the second year we recruited another cohort of 13 students

The 'journey' was extremely challenging, as counselling was not understood as a concept, and the term often only recognized as financial advice.

Two student graduates spoke of their training:

"We students are like family now. The relationship really is the therapy and the key to healing."

"I believe that we, as the first cohort of students, will be able to help develop the counselling profession in our nation."

The next chapter:

Sadly, the training was put on hold due to the covid pandemic. The good news is, that a number of NGO's have asked for the course to be re-started, as they spoke of experiencing a ripple of 'positive attitude' that was changing their staff. They verbalised an improvement in work ethic and enhanced mental well-being.

Thus, I will be returning to Cambodia as an independent volunteer in November for two years to restart the course, and provide training opportunities and workshops for Cambodian students in both university and village settings. It is my hope and belief, that the Cambodian team will solely manage the training from 2026.

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
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
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
