From Rev Nigel.....

I guess that for most of us, there are rarely enough hours in the day to do all the things we would like to do. This is certainly true for me in my role as the vicar of the Harton

Benefice, particularly as I am only half time. The administrative work and service preparation is still the same as it would be for a full-time vicar.

This unfortunately means that I don't have as much capacity as I would want for some areas of my ministry that I would like to spend more time on, such as pastoral visiting.

I'm not going to moan about it though, because I am given an incredible amount of help by numerous people from across the benefice. No one person can do everything!

Jesus was very aware that he could not carry out His ministry without help. So, he gathered around him a group of faithful followers, who were prepared to learn from him and then go out and carry out ministries in accordance with Jesus' instructions.

These were the disciples of Jesus, and they carried on His ministry and spreading the good news even after Jesus was no longer bodily with them. Those of us who continue to minister and live out our lives in Christian discipleship, whether in ordained or lay roles, are a continuation of Jesus' legacy, and follow in the footsteps of those first disciples.

I would certainly be setting myself up to fail if I believed I could physically do all the things I would like to in the ministry and mission life of our benefice.

With that in mind, and with very willing and faithful volunteers, forms of team ministry are being created in the benefice (which doesn't mean I am planning to be bodily elsewhere any time soon!).

We have established a Pastoral Care Team, which is being led by Adrian Watson, who has a heart for getting alongside people in need of pastoral care. He and the team will be visiting people in their homes and have also been visiting Prospect House, the care home in Gate Helmsley, much to the delight of the lovely residents.

We now also have a Healing Ministry Team headed up by Ian Lyall our Licensed Lay Minister. We had an evening service of stillness and healing in

St Mary's Sand Hutton, and more of these services will be held in our churches every few weeks.

These are quiet prayerful services with gentle music, and they offer an opportunity for people to have hands laid on them by members of the healing team, who have received appropriate training, and to have healing prayers said for themselves or for others. This form of healing prayer is intended to bring about a wholeness of body, mind and spirit. It can be a great comfort in times of ill health or stress. Eventually members of the Healing Team will be able to make home visits.

We also have a new Youth and Families Worker in the benefice, Rachael Tearney, who, amongst other things, is a professional drama coach and musician. Alongside her husband John, she has already created some wonderful all age worship services which have been very popular with their mix of storytelling, drama, music, songs and crafts. She is also running a drama group, Harton Youth Players at Sand Hutton Village Hall. Further details are in Rachael's article in this edition of The Circular, and on our benefice website. Rachael is also in the process of making sure each of our churches has books and materials for use by children. Watch out for Rachael's Boots and Brunch walks too. A nice bit of fresh air followed by tasty brunch and a brew in one of our churches. Fun for all the family.

It is a great privilege to be able to work alongside Adrian, Ian and Rachael, along with all the other wonderful people who make the benefice work so well.

As we move swiftly through Autumn and into the Advent and Christmas periods, and perhaps begin looking forwards into next year, there will be lots of things happening across the churches in the Harton Benefice. Details of services are in this edition of The Circular. I would also encourage you to keep an eye on our benefice website to keep up to date with what's coming up.



Benefice PCC.....

The Benefice PCC last met on 16th October. We welcomed the new Deputy Diocesan Secretary, Kate Cameron (who is also Director of Operational Support) as an observer. Kate has been

in post for only a few weeks, so she was pleased to be visiting local parishes. She was interested to see how effectively Harton functions as a Joint Benefice, co-ordinating work through the Joint PCC without any loss of autonomy to the local parishes.

The main business discussed was the recent appointment of Rachael Tearney as the Benefice Lead for Youth and Families. Rachael started in post on 1st September. She is making good progress: co-ordinating services of All Age Worship (AAW), establishing a youth drama group, setting up a walking group, engaging with local schools, and further developing the allotment at St Peter's churchyard Upper Helmsley. Individual PCCs will need to discuss how they will contribute financially to support this post.

The next meeting will be on Thursday 22nd January 2026 at 10.00 am at the Lyalls' in Claxton.



YOUTH AND FAMILIES' WORKER Rachael Tearney

I'm pleased to be able to share with you some of the events and activities I have undertaken as the new Youth and Families Worker for the Harton Benefice in this my first quarter.



As the long hot summer drew to a close, we launched our action plan to repurpose the allotment in Upper Helmsley churchyard. St Peter's has been home to the Green Space for the last few years and we felt it was time to move away from vegetable growing and towards cultivating flowers and herbs. Our hope is that from the gloom of Winter, Spring will burst forth



with a bloom of bulbs. Members of the benefice came together on a fine day in September, even Bonny the Vicar's dog came to help us, as we set about weeding, tidying and planting up bulbs. As the miracle of Spring unfolds, our planting plan is designed to bring colour and beauty to our new **Garden of Prayer and Healing** most of the year round. It is an ongoing project which you can be part of throughout the year.

We have complemented the garden with a Reflection Corner inside the church and we plan to host healing services outside (weather permitting) in the future. It has often been commented that God can be found in the garden and we trust that his spirit will go with us as we build this prayerful place.

The ministry team and I have begun to hold All Age Worship Services in the church. These are taking place every half term, with one service every six weeks. The services will move around the Benefice and the aim is to share the stories of the bible and in particular the gospels, in technicolour through song, drama and crafts. We hope that children and families from all villages will come along and share in the fun, music, fellowship and Christian message. In the last few months, we have heard about The Good Samaritan, The Holy Spirit and King David.

The Harton Youth Players are now up and running. We are a drama and performance group currently focused on years 3-6 and we meet on Monday evenings in Sand Hutton Village Hall. We have been exploring the world of Narnia through improvisation, storytelling, drama, song and games. If you would like to be involved, please contact me via the drama email at the bottom of this article. You can be of any age as a teenage group will be launched in the future and we are also open to those of you who love to design, draw or create costumes and sets.

Drama Club will end this term on November 14th with a Narnia Party at Sand Hutton village hall at 5pm. If you have not been able to attend drama but would like to come to the party you are welcome; please email the drama email so that we can cater accordingly.

Our last **All Age Worship** this year will be on November 16th at 10am in St Botolph's, Bossall. This will be our Narnia service.



Brunch and Boots is a new venture where we combine walking round the benefice with a late breakfast at the end. So far, we have used a circular route in Howsham, passing the Mill and beginning and ending at the Church. We were met with a deluge of conkers on our October Walk as the strong winds had blown them all from the trees. We have hung up our boots until the New Year now, but please keep an eye on the website, Instagram and join our mailing list to

learn of our next outing. Mums, Dads, Grandmas, Grandads, children and friendly dogs are all welcome.

We have enjoyed being invited to share in the Harvest Festival services at both Foston and Sand Hutton Schools and loved hearing all the wonderful singing, readings and prayers. So much hard work and preparation went in to producing these excellent performances, well done everyone! We are very much looking forward to the Christmas school services in December.

In October myself and other members of the benefice visited schools in Sand Hutton and Warthill with our Christmas Boxes appeal. We are very pleased that you are helping once again in this very generous activity of filling and wrapping beautiful Christmas Boxes to be sent to disadvantaged families in Romania. I know children have been thinking about the topic of Generosity in school this term and these Christmas gifts are a very special manifestation of those thoughts. I'd like to share that one of the ladies who helps distribute boxes in Romania was once a child in receipt of a box from the Harton benefice. It is wonderful to know that the children are part of this legacy of kindness.

I'd like to take a moment to remind you that children and families are welcome at all our services and I am busy creating Children's Corners in all our churches. If you want to come along with your children, take a seat near the Children's Corner and little ones can enjoy the books, activity sheets and colouring. Please join us



and don't worry if they talk a little; no one expects children to be as quiet as church mice. We are one family and you are all welcome.

Finally, as we look forward to Christmas, I hope that families will find the time to enjoy our Christmas Angel Holy Trail which runs from December 20th – Twelfth Night. Travel around the benefice churches and find the musical messages the Angels have left for you to discover. BARTON LE WILLOWS

'The Cinema'



"Oh, wow!" was one recent exclamation from a new visitor when they entered the hall for the first time to see a screen which is nine times the area of a fifty-inch TV. Another apologetically said, "I told the kids it wasn't a proper cinema". The screen is bigger than some

that you will see in commercial cinemas and we have active 3D which is better than the passive sort you will see in the big cinemas.

We have a growing number of regular visitors, but it is always great to see new people. Community cinema has so many advantages over its bigger cousins. It provides a local hub in the community where you can meet your friends and neighbours. Even if you don't know anyone when you first come you will quickly get to know the regulars. When we first started and I resurrected the half way intermission, that older ones will remember from their youth, I wondered whether it would annoy people. However, it turned out to be very successful with people chatting to each other about the film and local issues, grabbing an ice cream and stretching their legs. The difficulty is deciding when to start the film again!

We show a variety of films - some older ones and some that have just been in the cinema. "Conclave", "The Salt Path" and the original "Titanic" in 3D were particularly popular. We are also very happy to put on requests for people. Maybe you have a special film that you would like to see again in cinema quality. Recent requests have been "The Ballad of Wallis Island", "The Bourne Supremacy" and "Casablanca". This summer we also catered for a teenager's birthday request with a group of friends coming to see the 3D version of "Guardians of the Galaxy". If we can find it, we'll try and show it for you.

The friendly nature of the cinema means you can ask during the showing to adjust the volume or put the subtitles on. Our high quality surround sound system will also link to your hearing aids directly if you have Bluetooth. There are instances where the dialogue in some modern films can be quite indistinct and some help in understanding is appreciated by many. We may even be able to delay the start of a film a little if you are running late. You would be lucky to get this service at the Odeon!

I am often asked about pricing and we are called the free cinema. Unfortunately, if everyone paid nothing, we would go bankrupt! We work by a donation scheme to keep us to the terms of our cinema licence. You can donate whatever you like to see a film and this does include nothing. If you can afford a donation, it will keep the cinema running and help support the Village Hall. The most common donation by far is a fiver, but people do give more or less. We also ask that you pay for any ice cream or popcorn you get from us (£1 each). You are very welcome to bring any or all of your own food and drinks (including alcoholic ones). This means it's always much cheaper than commercial cinema.

We usually have a children's film (often 3D) at 2.00 pm, requests at 4.30 pm and a main film at 7.00 pm on alternate Saturdays. If you would like to find out what films will be showing and when please join our mailing list by emailing bartonlewillows@gmail.com. You would be very welcome to join us at the cinema.

I'd like to finish by thanking everyone, but particularly the regulars, who have come along over the last eighteen months to support the cinema and make it such a friendly experience. Without you this local service would have gone the same way as the village shops, post offices and pubs so many of which have disappeared. Please help keep our community going.

BOSSALL

We completed all the renovation works at St Botolph's church at the end of June. As part of the Lottery Heritage Funded project we also focused on heritage, inclusion and nature. We invited a group of reception and year one children from Sand Hutton Primary School to the church at St Botolph's.

We spent a lively, fun morning in the churchyard learning about wildlife habitats and engaging in nature based activities. They built a bug hotel, bee boxes and ladybird lodges.



They watched and learnt about the resident house martins and created collage nature pictures. A great time was had by all. Worksheets have been created for children visiting the church relating to both flora and fauna as well as quizzes about the history inside the church. In addition a booklet has been written - "The History of St Botolph's Church and Village of Bossall".

Also a churchyard survey has taken place and the community payback team have undertaken some maintenance to the churchyard, strimming around the gravestones and tidying the area. This only took two days instead of four the previous year as the grass wasn't as thick to cut.

Bossall PCC wishes to express our thanks to all those who played their part in helping with this project. In particular we wish to make special mention of Ellen Stott's extensive and vital input throughout the process, from securing the Lottery Funding and helping manage the contract and subsequent fulfilment of the Lottery conditions. Without her help this would not have been possible. On the 7th September we had a service with the Bishop of Selby. It was a celebration of all the work that has been completed in the last nine months. She gave a wonderful sermon describing how the walls of the church have enormous history and we are part of the stones that continue to make history.

We had an All Age Worship service on the 21st September with Rachel Benson and Rachael Tearney. The theme was young King David. They had two children who thoroughly enjoyed decorating harps. Oliver and Gillian Morley stood in as churchwardens as we were away.

Finally on Saturday 11th October we had a fundraising concert in St Botolph's Church with Ripon Resound. Sadly, we didn't have quite the turnout that we would have liked, but enough to make it a very special evening.

The choir sang a mixed repertoire as well as poetry and solo pieces which were all to an exceptional high standard.

Drinks and nibbles were served in the interval with the evening raising much needed funds of just over £700.



BUTTERCRAMBE

We have had one service this summer on Sunday 17th August which Reverend Nigel took and Brian Atkinson kindly played the organ. We had over thirty in the congregation and refreshments were enjoyed at the end.

By the time you receive this Circular, we will have had our Harvest Festival service which we all look forward to. Considering the harvest was brought in early this year, the fruits and nuts on the trees and in the hedgerows have been plentiful and many branches are still laden.





A bit of history from our church. On the north wall of the chancel is a large mural tablet to Dorothea, she was the wife of Richard Darley of Aldby Park. She died in 1674 and would have lived in the previous house which was a medieval timber framed building which we believe was situated in the park. On the opposite wall is an elaborate marble monument to her husband Richard Darley who died in 1706 and two of his four sons. Sadly, the inscription is very worn now and almost impossible to make out. Richard and Dorothea had four sons and they all died unmarried so the Estate passed to their sister Jane Darley and she and husband John Brewster who was from Hertfordshire built the current house in 1726. It will be 300 years old next year!

CRAMBE

There is remarkably little to report since the last issue of The Circular. We held our Harvest festival service on Sunday October 19th. The church looked lovely. Why Reducing Our Carbon Footprint in Our Local Community Matters

It's often said that the UK only contributes around 1% of global CO₂ emissions – so why should we bother to reduce our carbon footprint? The truth is, there are several good reasons why taking action really does make a difference.

1. Our history

The UK was the birthplace of the Industrial Revolution. Over the last two centuries, we've emitted far more carbon per person than most countries – about 5% of all CO₂ levels in the atmosphere come from our historic burning of fossil fuels. We have a duty to lead by example.
